THE TRENT AND DERWENT PARISH CHURCHES RECTOR'S REPORT

2021-2022

It is hard to believe that it has been 3 years since we last had a Benefice Annual meeting and since I last wrote a formal report about the Benefice. So thank you for attending this evening's meeting. It is really good for us to get together from the different parishes in order to meet one another, hear what is happening in our different situations and encourage one another.



The Covid-19 pandemic has affected us in so many ways as a society and that is certainly reflected in our experience of being the Church during the last two years. There have been two periods when public worship was suspended for several months and, even when we were able to resume services again there were considerable restrictions in place. At the same time, we were not able to meet in our usual groups during the week either, which left many people feeling isolated and out of touch. Thankfully in all of the parishes people made a great effort to keep in touch by phone and many of us learnt the benefits as well as the disadvantages of Zoom! We also decided at the beginning of lockdown to record services and put them online, something which I have continued to do even after the resumption of public worship, as they continue to be appreciated by those people who for whatever reasons can no longer manage to attend church in person. The pandemic has taught us the importance of online provision and, in addition to the online services and the websites, several of our churches now have social media pages, which are very useful for getting people engaged with what is happening.

The pandemic has, needless to say, had an effect on the finances of the parishes. Periods, when the church has not been meeting for worship or when attendance was considerably reduced, have resulted in a massive downturn in income, particularly in those parishes where there was no scheme for regular giving. This has resulted in a considerable reduction in the ability to pay Common Fund allocations to the Diocese. In terms of congregational life, the pandemic has in many of the smaller parishes hastened a decline in attendance at worship which was already perceivable over many years. One of our parishes, Weston on Trent, has applied to the Bishop to be regarded as a "Festival Church" i.e. one which will only be offering public worship at certain significant times in the Church year. This may be on the cards for some of our other parishes too over the next few years.

Emerging from the pandemic gave us the opportunity to look afresh at the provision of services across the Benefice, which was particularly necessary as the number of available ministers has diminished over the last few years. Over the last four years 2 curates (Ed and Jane) have moved on, 1 retired priest (Ian) moved away, Suzanne and John decided that the time had come to officially "retire" from taking services and a newly licensed Reader (Graham), sadly died. I am very grateful to Paul and Bruce for their willingness to take services nearly every Sunday and to the Barrow "Team", who continue to lead worship themselves once a month.

If that all sounds like doom and gloom, let me inject a measure of optimism by describing some of the good things happening around the parishes:

Twyford Thanks to the efforts of Anne Bennett and other members of the congregation, we have been able to complete some significant and ongoing work to the fabric of St. Andrew's Church. Urgent work has been carried out on the spire and tower, the buttresses at the east end of the church and some of the windows. Further work will be needed on the rainwater goods and anything else shown up by this summer's inspection by the architect! We are having an Open Afternoon at Twyford on Saturday 18th June.

Barrow The congregation at St. Wilfrid's, assisted by a very active "Friends" group, have been pioneering what can be done with an ancient building in the 21st century both to preserve and to promote the heritage,

whilst also creating a space for the community to use. Thanks largely to support from the Heritage Lottery Fund, the church has been completely re-ordered, removing the pews and levelling the floor in order to create a more useable community space. The project focussed upon the heritage of the Church, particularly its fascinating links with the Knights of St. John. Since completion of the Transformation Project, the community space has been well-used (even hosting a wedding reception!) and a wonderful programme of events is underway, focussing on Heritage Talks, Heritage Workshops and Family Fun. Where else around here can you have a go at stone carving and do some family archaeology?!

Swarkestone The plans to convert the present transept meeting room into a better and more accessible community facility by screening it off from the main body of the church, lowering the floor to the level of the nave and building an extension, which will provide toilet and kitchen facilities and alternative access from outside the building, finally got underway at the beginning of 2021. The work took longer than expected, because of material shortages during the pandemic, but we officially opened the Harpur Room at our Open Day two weeks ago. I think Miss Airmyne Harpur-Crewe, whose legacy made this possible, would have been very pleased with the result. We also brought back a 16th century boar and coronet (Harpur family crest) from Calke Abbey, where they had been on loan for decades, and have rehoused them in a museum-quality cabinet in the chancel. We enjoy a good congregational life at our monthly service, which doesn't seem to have been adversely affected by the pandemic.

Weston The congregation at Weston was very small before the pandemic, but we sadly emerged from lock-down with four regular worshippers and a PCC of the Rector plus two! Following a meeting in the Autumn, we applied to become a Festival Church (as was mentioned earlier) and in the New Year appealed to the community for help with maintaining the church and churchyard. A public meeting in February attracted 60 people and we subsequently set up a Friends of St. Mary's Group with subsidiary groups for maintenance and cleaning, which have already done wonders in the church and its surroundings. Out of a difficult situation something positive seems to be emerging. We met this week with the Diocesan authorities to discuss two proposed projects for developing the churchyard to preserve wildlife and involve the community.

Aston Thankfully at Aston, we managed to bounce back fairly quickly from the pandemic and have recruited some new members in recent weeks. Also the finances were considerably helped by the fact that a good proportion of the congregation had joined the Parish Giving Scheme, which meant that they were still giving regularly to the church even when there were no services. The inability to hold our usual big fundraising events has, however, effected our overall income and we are well short of being able to pay our large Common Fund allocation in full. One positive outcome of the pandemic was the formation of a small choir, which now helps with leading the singing at our Sunday services. On the fabric side, we were able to build a new staircase under the tower to greatly improve the access to the ringing chamber. It has also enabled us to create a community library in the tower room, which has been well used by the people of the village. We had the church completely rewired and installed a new lighting system, which has made the church much brighter, especially on dull days. We have plans during the next 12 months to completely overhaul and renovate the pipe organ. It has been good to see many of the church groups meeting again after the restrictions of the past 2 years, which have probably made us realise how much we have taken for granted the importance of meeting together to support and encourage one another.

Shardlow Over the last 3 years, St. James' has had considerable work done to the stonework of the walls and the tower and everything has been completely re-roofed. The Hayward Room at the back of church has been modernised and made more comfortable with new lighting, heating, carpet and furniture. We have installed an electronically operated lock on the church door, which enables people to come in and use the library, which we have created in the Hayward Room. We are looking forward to opening the church for the Inland Port Festival on the 10th and 11th September. As at Weston, the regular congregation is now very small indeed and the possibility of becoming a Festival Church may need to be considered for Shardlow too in the near future.

Elvaston Much has been done at St. Bartholomew's in the last couple of years to encourage visitors. The trips up the tower have been especially popular and a good fundraiser. Sadly, we have temporarily suspended these while we investigate the health and safety issues arising from visitors climbing the tower.

We hope to begin them again soon. Elvaston still proves a very popular venue for weddings and funerals. We are looking forward to our Open Weekend at the end of August.

This is just a brief overview of some of the things, which have occupied the time and energy of many people in our congregations during the last two to three years. Please forgive me if I have failed to highlight something else of importance to you. I cannot mention everything, because so much goes into maintaining the presence and worship life of our churches, and I should therefore like to take this opportunity to thank the loyalty and faithfulness of the many people who, both publicly and in quieter, hidden ways give so much of their time, energy and money to the work of the church.

On a personal level. I should like to say a sincere thank you for the support you all give to me and to the other members of the team in our ministry. Your support for my family and for my involvement with Derby County and with the Kenya project is especially appreciated. As I write this, I leave for Kenya in 10 days' time and thanks to people's support I shall go to Chaddy Mission School equipped with a printer, stationery, toiletries and, yes, a lot of sanitary products!

Tony would like to say a big thank you to the congregations for responding to his appeal for Chaddy Mission School. Lots of stationery and toiletries have been donated and thanks to the generous monetary gifts from the MU and others (over £300), he has been able to purchase 185 reusable sanitary pads for the teenage girls at the school, which will hopefully mean that they will not have to miss their schooling for several days each month. The products we have purchased will support an education programme, which some of the ladies in Tony's team are going to deliver while they are there. Your generosity will make such a difference to the lives of around 60 girls at Chaddy Mission. The proceeds of the Charity of the month collection at Aston for April have contributed to the purchase of a reconditioned printer, which will take up a lot of space in one of Tony's cases! It will enable the school to print its own exam papers and other materials, thus saving them money. On behalf of Pastor Geoffrey and the staff and children of Chaddy Mission School, a big thank you for your gifts!



Following a meeting with Nigel Sharrett from DAC, permission has been given to begin clearing work in the copse to enable light to enter and to clear the floor of ivy. This will enable oy=other plant species to colonise the area and therefore attract insect etc.—in other words to increase the biological diversity of the copse. There will be more details made available as the scheme progresses. Another project of wilding the area and possible tree planting was also discussed. Wilding area could be trailed to enable visitors to explore and enjoy the area. The planting of trees would require a faculty along with a plan of tree locations.

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
